





PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

1. Ash Dieback work at Bagpath Common. In the interests of residents and other road users, the Parish Council has been trying since early 2020 to get the appropriate authorities to manage the risks from ash dieback at Bagpath Common. Since October 2020 GCC Highways have agreed to make safe those trees which are threatening the highway. Work was originally scheduled for November 2021 but has been postponed several times because of funding issues and work on higher priority roads.

We were pleased to hear that work had been scheduled for the week of 12-16 June 2023, even though GCC Highways predicted it would not be possible to deal with all the affected trees within that week. Because of the need to maintain access for residents. small easily moveable equipment had to be used and the trees were felled in small pieces to avoid blocking the road. There were also many vehicles requesting access during the closure period, typically 2 or three an hour, each of which required the work to be interrupted and equipment moved, and significantly reduced the rate of progress. It is obviously disappointing for all concerned that the work could not be completed. GCC Highways have added the outstanding work to their schedule but are not yet able to say when it might be done. We will continue to seek action on those trees which are endangering the roads.

2. Hazlecote Lane: Gravel and potholes
Those who use Hazlecote Lane, from
Kingscote village to the A46, will know that
there are some sections with bad potholes
and much loose gravel. Unfortunately, a
cyclist crashed recently when descending
the hill below the trig point and required an
ambulance. GCC Highways have erected
warning signs and swept gravel from a
small section of the road where the
accident occurred, and have been
requested to undertake improvements
elsewhere as soon as possible.

3. Next meeting

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

At time of drafting the newsletter, the following was listed on the CDC website with a consultation date in July.

· Kingscote Lodge GL8 8YN - Erection of a single storey side extension, front porch, detached garage and associated works. Consultation end date 7th July 2023

Note- Only applications classed by CDC as 'current', using the keyword Kingscote (i.e. the parish), and with relevant consultation expiry dates are included in The Forerunner each month. The standard consultation expiry date seems to be around 21 days after validation of the application by CDC although there are exceptions and sometimes applications do not seem to be listed on the website immediately after validation. Applications may not feature in the Forerunner if both the validation date and the expiry date fall in between Forerunner publications. If you are keen to keep abreast of all new planning applications, it is recommended that you check the CDC website regularly and/or

Local attractions

The summer holidays are approaching and people may be thinking about local days out. Sebastian Cooper has put together this article on the Corinium Museum and noted that it is a very child-friendly museum. Please let us know of any other places you feel are worth a visit and we can include them in a future edition of The Forerunner.

Corinium Museum, by Sebastian Cooper
If you are looking for a local attraction to visit, why not try the
Corinium Museum in Cirencester? As well as being an excellent
museum with an extensive collection of Roman and other exhibits,
you will see some treasures from the early history of Kingscote.

Cirencester, known to the Romans as Corinium or Corinium Dobunnorum, was one of the most important towns in Roman Britain. A Roman fort was established at Corinium in the territory of the friendly tribe of the Dobunni about a year after the Roman conquest of Britain. Three main Roman roads met in Corinium: the Fosse Way. Akeman Street, and Ermin Street. When a wall was built around the Roman town in the late 2nd century, it enclosed 240 acres (1 km²), making Corinium the second-largest town by area in Britain. Many Roman remains have been found in the town and the surrounding area and many finds are on show at the museum.

In the 1970s a Roman settlement was excavated in a field named The Chessalls, between the Hunter's Hall and Home Farm. The site covers 30 hectares and was occupied from the late 1st century AD through to its heyday in the 4th century. It may have been a small town or villa estate, with evidence of a series of strip buildings replaced in the 4th century by a house within a walled compound. The house seems to have been of high status, with mosaic floors, including a Venus mosaic, and wall-plaster paintings now displayed in the museum (see photos below), and hypocausts.

The mosaic depicts Venus holding a mirror and wearing a crown and a bead necklace. The centrepiece of Venus is of finer workmanship than the rest of the floor and may have been pre-fabricated in a workshop and transported to Kingscote as a finished object, with the rest of the mosaic being made by less skilled craftsmen.



The wall painting was recovered from the same room as the mosaic and has been reconstructed from thousands of fragments. It is believed to represent Venus and Cupid with the armour of the god Mars, together with other gods and goddesses. It was painted in a fresco technique, i.e. painted while the plaster was still wet.
