Dear Friends.

PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

The most recent meeting of the Council was on Tuesday 11th July. Our new District Councillor, Tony Slater, attended as well as four parishioners.

1. Speeding and parking in Kingscote village

Following requests from residents, we discussed ideas for reducing speed and facilitating large vehicle access through the village. We will invite GCC Highways for a site visit to help us decide which options might be viable and will then consult residents.

2. Maintenance of parish assets

The two defibrillators in the parish are now regularly monitored to check they are in good working order and both have new pads fitted. Councillors carried out basic maintenance on the bus shelter, phone box and war memorial on July 21st.

3. Hazlecote Valley: Potholes and salt bins

Some of the worst potholes in the Hazlecote Valley have recently been marked for repair and we hope this work will happen soon. Since there are no salt bins in the valley we are liaising with GCC Highways to install one on each hill - the parish council will have to buy them but Highways will supply the salt. We are also buying a replacement for a damaged bin in Bagpath.

4. Community engagement with the Matara Centre

Mr Geoffrey Higgins, the owner of the Matara Centre, is generous in allowing parishioners to access the main field and he would like to increase engagement with the community. We propose to hold a community event to discuss the Centre's long-term vision and opportunities for volunteering to help with maintenance. This is planned for Sunday 1 October at 11.00 and will be followed by a 'bring and share' picnic lunch and a walk around the grounds.

The next meeting of Kingscote Parish Council will be on Tuesday 26th September at 7.30pm in the village hall. All parishioners are welcome to attend.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

At time of drafting the newsletter, there were no applications listed on the CDC website with a consultation deadline in August Note- Only applications classed by CDC as 'current', using the keyword Kingscote (i.e. the parish), and with relevant consultation expiry dates are included in The Forerunner each month. The standard consultation expiry date seems to be around 21 days after validation of the application by CDC although there are exceptions and sometimes applications do not seem to be listed on the website immediately after validation. Applications may not feature in the Forerunner if both the validation date and the expiry date fall in between Forerunner publications. If you are keen to keep abreast of all new planning applications, it is recommended that you check the CDC website regularly and/or register to receive email alerts direct from CDC.

Church news

Documents showing the Kingscote churchyard map and transcriptions of key information from each gravestone will be available in the next month from the Kingscote online website, with a hard copy available in the church. We are most grateful to Brian McTear, Harry Tubbs and Godfrey Ainsworth for producing the coded map (done in 2016-17). This included use of a drone to photograph the grave locations plus manually plotting the ones hidden from the drone by trees. Sections of the churchyard and each grave were then coded to produce the final map.

More recently, Sebastian Cooper has undertaken the mammoth task of transcribing key information from each gravestone and painstakingly linking them to the codes in the map.

These two documents should provide valuable information for those seeking to find graves of family members, and they also provide information for those with a general interest in the history of Kingscote.

In due course we will provide a list of gravestones / tombstones noted as being in need of repair as it is the relevant family's responsibility to repair the gravestones / tombstones.

Guided walks with Cotswold Wardens in August 2023

There are a number of warden-led walks coming up. There is no need to book and there is no charge for joining the walks, 'though there is a box for a voluntary contribution towards materials for our work on footpath maintenance. Walks start usually at 10.00 am. and will return to the starting point. A packed lunch is advisable. Please double check for on the Cotswold National Landscape (formerly AONB) website.

Tuesday, 8th August, 2023 – Start: 10:00 am Hawkesbury Upton

Difficulty: MODERATE Duration: 3.0 HOURS Distance: 6.0 MILES

Start point: Hawkesbury Upton Village hall car park

Discover the area around Hawkesbury Upton where the famous landmark of the Somerset Monument can be seen and explore the beauty of two ancient commons.

Wednesday, 9th August, 2023 - Start: 10:00 am at Brimscombe

Difficulty: MODERATE Duration: 3 HOURS Distance: 5 MILES

Start point: BRIMSCOMBE PORT CAR PARK, PORT LANE, BRIMSCOMBE. GL5 2QJ

The walk will follow trails and roads around Toadsmoor Valley including sections of the Chalford Biodiversity Trail. It provides excellent views not only over Toadsmoor but also the Golden Valley

Friday, 11th August, 2023 - Start: 10:00 am Sapperton

Difficulty: MODERATE Duration: 3 HOURS Distance: 5.5 MILES

Start point: Sapperton Village, by the telephone box near the church. GL7 6LG.

A circular walk in and out (and up and down) the Frome valley, initially towards Edgeworth and its polo grounds, then through the nature reserves of Daneway Banks and Siccaridge Wood.

Tuesday, 15th August, 2023 - Start: 10:00 am Amberley

Difficulty: EASY Duration: 1.5 HOURS Distance: 2.5 MILES

Start point: AMBERLEY INN, AMBERLEY. NOT THE INN CAR PARK PLEASE.

Enjoy a summer meander through Amberley lanes and countryside. With views overlooking the Woodchester valley. An easy walk suitable for families and buggies.

Wednesday, 23rd August, 2023 - Start: 12:10 am Miserden

Difficulty: MODERATE Duration: 3 HOURS Distance: 5.5 MILES

Start point: Miserden Village Centre.

From Miserden we descend into the Frome Valley and take a wooded path to Edgeworth before returning to Miserden via Sudgrove.

Friday, 25th August, 2023 - Start: 10:00 am Sherston

Difficulty: MODERATE Duration: 5.5 HOURS Distance: 10.0 MILES

Start point: Outside the Sherston village shop and post office in the village square.

From Sherston we will walk along the Sherston branch of the River Avon to Didmarton before returning via Sopworth and Luckington.
